Patrick McNeill—our river champion!

The River Restoration Centre is a UKwide not-for-profit organisation supported by the Environment Agency, Natural England, and the equivalent bodies in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. Each year, it identifies a number of 'River Champions' with the aim of "celebrating the outstanding efforts of individuals contributing to improving rivers for people and wildlife in their area".



Patrick McNeill, the Parish Council's ranger for The Meads, also works as a volunteer for the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust. The Trust nominated him for this national award and, at a dinner in Brighton in April, he was presented with this certificate in recognition of his "outstanding contribution to Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust and the improvement of the River Lea and its catchment", with a particular mention of the talks that Patrick gives and the support given by the Parish Council and the local community.

Maintaining our historic High Street

John Burgess can often be seen in our High Street taking pride in the appearance of our village centre. You may or may not know that John had a bit of a shock in January when he experienced a small stroke. That event has made him realize that the maintenance work he has been doing for some 20 years will need to be continued when he is no longer around. Wheathampstead Open Spaces Volunteers (WOSV) news



April's session was at **Devil's Dyke** where fine weather made for an enjoyable few hours in the fresh air. Previous work had seen improvements to the 'top' path, clearing the entrance through the brick pillars at the northern end and removal of invading scrub and holly for the first 50 metres or so. This session concentrated on improving



the small car park area and the removal of some dead overhanging trees.

If you get a chance to visit our

Scheduled Ancient Monument, take time to find the magnificent beech tree (right). It's 50m south from the gates on the western bank clinging to the side of the dyke with a spaghetti-like mass of exposed roots.

In March we visited Gustard Wood where early spring had produced flowering gorse



and brimstone butterflies. Here we concentrated on nipping back the holly regrowth that had occurred since our last visit. Pushing back the edges of the woodland around the heathland area will help to preserve this important habitat and removing corridors of holly will bring light to the woodland floor.

Amwell Local Fundraisers (ALF)

Almost twenty years ago, ALF held its first Tuesday night Bingo session which is still held on the last Tuesday of each month at the Mead Hall, 6.30pm for 7.00pm (except during the winter and August) and all over-60s are welcome.

In addition to Bingo, various outings are arranged during the year as well as the well-attended Christmas party.

Many of ALF's original members have sadly passed away and donations in their memory have been made to the other charities with which they were connected eg Grove House Hospice, MacMillan Nurses, RNIB and RNLI to name a few.

Memories of Village Days

Our first appearance was in 1977 when we drove our decorated car in the parade around the village to celebrate the Queen's Silver Jubilee. The next opportunity wasn't until 1995 when we took part in the parade at Village Day with a sideshow and collected for The British Diabetic Association (BDA).



Our eldest son had been diagnosed a diabetic in 1968 when he was only eight and we began our fund-raising for the BDA. Sadly Martin died on the newly-opened village bypass in 1979 aged 19 while riding his motorcycle and we have continued fund-raising for diabetic research in memory of him ever since. In 2008 my husband Peter was awarded the MBE by the Queen in recognition of 40 years of dedicated service to the diabetic community.

Over the years we have organised a variety of sideshows at the Village Days as well as playing our street organ. Together with our grandchildren we were awarded 3rd prize in the parade in 1996 and again in 2001.

We are proud to have been part of many lovely and successful Village Days over the past 21 years but sadly last year, 2016, our usual position was allocated to others and we weren't able to collect for Diabetes UK. However, we were determined to be part of the day so invited friends who also have a street organ but who collect for Macmillan Nurses to help us out and we collected for them instead.

We would like to thank all those kind people who have supported us over the many years for their interest and their encouragement that has helped us to keep going despite the tragedy in our lives.

Charity Garden comes to Wheathampstead!

To celebrate the launch of their Summer of Open Gardens initiative, Essex & Herts Air Ambulance is launching their Flagship Garden in Wheathampstead on 14 May 2017 at Castle Farm, Lower Luton Road, AL4 8HU from 2-4pm.



The 20-acre garden boasts a variety of beautiful settings. You can take a stroll through the semiformal gardens around the house, or visit its other wonders. Wild areas by the river will give a peek at local wildlife, as will the spring-fed ponds and

bog garden. If arboretums are more appealing to you, then you're in luck, or you can just roam the areas where wildflowers grow plentifully.

Castle Farm is within a designated Hertfordshire Wildlife Site, and you'll be best placed to view the natural habitat, including rare and native trees, on the hour-long wildlife walk provided on the day by Tim Hill, Conservation Manager of Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust.

Anyone can participate in the Summer of Open Gardens initiative which runs from May to September. Whatever size garden you have, Essex & Herts Air Ambulance asks you to open your garden, share your joy and help save lives this summer.

It costs £500,000 a month to keep the Air Ambulance Charity operational. Whether you sell tickets to enter your garden, run a raffle or a tombola, or simply have a donation box – your garden could make all the difference.



New defibrillator (AED)

If someone collapses in front of you then you should:

- stay calm and THINK. A few seconds taking in the situation and not panicking can make a huge difference.
- call for help. Ring 999 for the code to open the defibrillator box. Get support from the operator and others.

If:

- the patient looks lifeless/ pale/ not responding then Grab your new AED.
- their heart has not stopped and they have just fainted then having it there as an option is a good idea.
- they groan/ moan / talk to you then that is a SIGN OF LIFE.
- there are NO signs of life then turn the AED on.

It's in a case so open it up and press the ON button - that may not be obvious if you are panicking.

The great thing is it talks to you and explains what you need to do. I suggest one person stays in command of the AED and repeats what it says. Make sure you are loud!

- It will ask you to connect the pads to the patient's bare chest as shown.
- WHEN IT SAYS 'ANALYSING' THEN EVERYONE NEEDS TO STAND CLEAR
- The AED will decide if the patient needs a shock—a button will flash once it has warned you that a shock is required.
- MAKE SURE NO ONE IS TOUCHING THE PATIENT THEN PRESS THE FLASHING LIGHT.

The patient will jolt a little as the shock goes through them. If recommended, restart chest compressions for two minutes.

The AED will go through a two minute cycle before talking to you again so do not switch it off.

Doing this will optimise the chances of survival. Sometimes we have an opportunity to save some patients but not all of them. Attaching the AED early can save a life.
