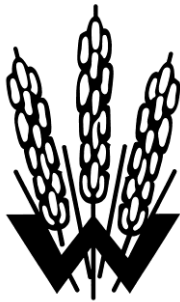

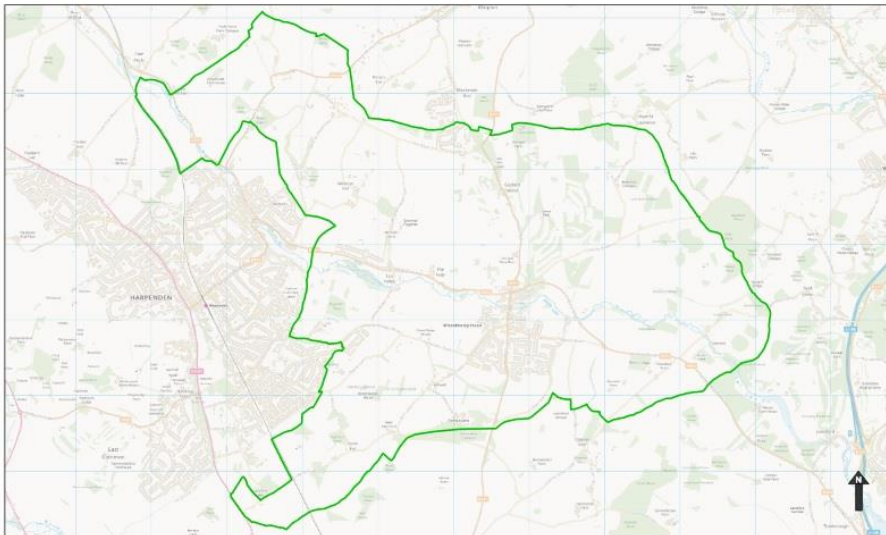
1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 This document represents the Neighbourhood Plan for Wheathampstead parish. It represents one part of the development plan for the parish over the period 2016 to 2026, the other part being the St Albans Local District Plan, 1994, to be replaced by, when adopted, the St Albans Strategic Local Plan.
- 1.2 St Albans City and District Council, as the local planning authority, designated a Neighbourhood Area for the whole of the Wheathampstead parish in July 2015 to enable Wheathampstead Town Council to prepare the Neighbourhood Plan. The Plan has been prepared by the community through the Wheathampstead Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group (WNPSG).



- 1.3 The Wheathampstead Neighbourhood Plan (WNP) is being prepared in accordance with the Town & Country Planning Act 1990, the Planning & Compulsory Purchase Act 2004, the Localism Act 2011 and the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations 2012. The WNPSG has prepared the plan to establish a vision for the future of the parish and to set out how that vision will be realised through planning land use and development change over the plan period 2016 to 2026.
- 1.4 The purpose of the Neighbourhood Plan is to guide development within the parish and provide guidance to any interested parties wishing to submit planning applications for development within the parish. The process of producing a plan has sought to involve the community as widely as possible and the different topic areas are reflective of matters that are of considerable importance to Wheathampstead, its residents, businesses and community groups.
- 1.5 Each section of the plan covers a different topic. Under each heading there is the justification for the policies presented which provides the necessary understanding of the policy and what it is seeking to achieve. The policies themselves are presented in the blue boxes. It is these policies against which planning applications will be assessed. It is advisable that, in order to understand the full context for any individual policy, it is read in conjunction with the supporting text.
- 1.6 The map below shows the boundary of the Neighbourhood Plan area, which is contiguous with the boundary of Wheathampstead parish.

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National policy

1.7 The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) states:

"Neighbourhood planning gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and deliver the sustainable development they need. Parishes ... can use neighbourhood planning to set planning policies through neighbourhood plans to determine decisions on planning applications (para.183).

Neighbourhood planning provides a powerful set of tools for local people to ensure that they get the right types of development for their community. The ambition of the neighbourhood should be aligned with the strategic needs and priorities of the wider local area.

Neighbourhood plans must be in general conformity with the strategic policies of the Local Plan. To facilitate this, local planning authorities should set out clearly their strategic policies for the area and ensure that an up-to-date Local Plan is in place as quickly as possible. Neighbourhood plans should reflect these policies and neighbourhoods should plan positively to support them. Neighbourhood plans and orders should not promote less development than set out in the Local Plan or undermine its strategic policies (para.184).

Outside these strategic elements, neighbourhood plans will be able to shape and direct sustainable development in their area. Once a neighbourhood plan has demonstrated its general conformity with the strategic policies of

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the Local Plan and is brought into force, the policies it contains take precedence over existing non-strategic policies in the Local Plan for that neighbourhood, where they are in conflict. Local planning authorities should avoid duplicating planning processes for non-strategic policies where a neighbourhood plan is in preparation (para.185)".

- 1.8 The St Albans Local District Plan was adopted in 1994. An updated Strategic Local Plan is currently being developed which will supersede the former document. The timescale for the Development Plan is estimated as late 2016, therefore is likely to provide the strategic context for the neighbourhood plan. Should the Plan not be complete, the existing Core Strategy remain of relevance.

Consultation

- 1.9 The WNPSG has developed the Neighbourhood Plan through extensive engagement with the community.
- 1.10 An extensive programme of engagement has also been undertaken to identify further issues, develop policy options and seek feedback on the emerging plan. This has included:
- Public exhibitions and drop-in events
 - Face-to-face sessions with local organisations including schools, scouts and guides and other young peoples' groups, the business forum, and voluntary and interest groups
 - A questionnaire distributed to all households.

GLOSSARY

We can add to this as necessary:

- **Affordable housing** - Social rented, affordable rented and intermediate housing, provided to eligible households whose needs are not met by the market
- **Comparison retailing** – this is shopping for higher value goods, such as white goods, clothes, electrical items, etc, that is not undertaken on a regular basis.
- **Convenience retailing** - this is primarily food shopping and shopping for everyday grocery items.
- **Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)** – a fixed, non-negotiable contribution that must be made by new development. It is chargeable on each net additional square metre of development built and is set by St Albans City and District Council.
- **National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)** – the national planning policy document which sets out the Government’s planning policies for England and how these are expected to be applied.
- **Social rented housing** - Housing owned by local authorities and private registered providers for which guideline target rents are determined through the national rent regime.
- **Section 106 agreement** - A mechanism under Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 which makes a development proposal acceptable in planning terms, that would not otherwise be acceptable
- **Real time passenger information (RTPI)** - an electronic information system that may include predictions about arrival and departure times, as well as information about the nature and causes of disruptions. It may be used both physically within a transportation hub and remotely using a web browser or mobile device.
- **Conservation area** - an area of notable environmental or historical interest or importance which is protected by law against undesirable changes.
