Think before you park!

Would a fire engine be able to get to your house in an

emergency? Wheathampstead Fire Fighters are urging people to think about the way they park their vehicles to prevent lives from being put at risk. We know space can sometimes be limited but please try and leave enough room for a fire engine to get past should it need to



respond to an emergency. How would you feel if you have an emergency and we can't get to you or were delayed because of careless, inconsiderate parking?



Recently fire engines were unable to attend a fire in King Edward Place because of careless parking next to the bakers—this might have cost people their lives.

We have on several occasions

had cars parked in the fire station drives. This is reckless, would delay us turning out, and could potentially be life threatening. If you park on our drive you can expect a visit from a police officer asking why. It's never right to block the exits or entrances to the fire station even if it's only for a couple of minutes.

Wheathampstead Open Spaces Volunteers (WOSV) news

The Wheathampstead Open Spaces Volunteers (WOSV) have been busy since the last edition of The Pump.

On a fine Saturday morning in December, we returned to Gustard Wood to continue with the programme of clearing invasive holly. The aim is to restore light to the woodland floor so that a variety of plants can re-establish, in particular the gorse and the juniper that once characterised this area of acid grassland—a habitat that has become a rarity in Hertfordshire.

On this occasion, we focused on opening up the view from the lay-by all the way through to the eastern boundary with Astridge Farm and the Lamer estate, as shown in the two photographs below.

The work also revealed more of the ancient field boundary that runs north/south between the Lamer estate and Gustard Wood Common with its earth bank and remains of a laid hedge, and the holloway that runs parallel to it up towards The Cross Keys. The History Society is looking into the possibility of excavating this area.

Next, on a rather colder Saturday morning in January, we paid a return visit to the Local Nature Reserve at Butterfield

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Road to continue the work of maintaining and improving the grassy chalk bank on the southern boundary. Clearing invasive vegetation and cutting and removing the grass each year improves the habitat for birds and insects as well as



wild flowers. The number of bullfinches and linnets has increased year on year and the butterflies are a delight in the summer. The photograph shows some of the working party admiring the results of clearing one of the two south -facing areas of self-set ash trees that we worked on.

Vulnerable during a power cut?

Twiddlemuffs

What is a Twiddlemuff? Well, it is a double thickness sensory band with bits and bobs attached inside and out. They are used to calm patients with dementia or Alzheimer's, who often have restless hands. These



muffs are a wonderful source of entertainment, providing sensory stimulation to keep the patient's hands 'busy.' In addition, they help to reduce agitation while ensuring their hands are snug and warm.

On an ordinary Tuesday afternoon in November, it was fascinating to visit an industrious group of twelve mainly WI ladies who were knitting something different: twiddlemuffs.

According to Pam Sanderson, the organiser of the project, the reaction is like someone 'switched the lights on' when Twiddlemuffs are given to patients. She told me that no-one makes toys for dementia patients, but these work and are in demand from care homes and hospitals. The group would also like to offer them to local people who live at home



It is amazing that such a simple and inexpensive idea can be so effective. Most ladies who knit have left-over wool and the group would welcome supplies, as well as large buttons, beads, toggles or ribbons to make the muffs more interesting.

Last month we published an article about Gillie who raised money for dementia by running. Similarly, these ladies' work made me realise how our village is full of 'everyday heroes' who give up their time to help others.

Please let us know about other examples, so we can all celebrate some other extraordinary achievements.

Affinity Water - Water Saving Programme

Residents may be aware that Affinity's Water Saving Programme is moving into our area. In the coming months, you will be receiving information about their



programme and what you can expect during the installation of a water meter.

The area they supply is one of the fastest-growing, most economically active regions of the UK (over 3.6m people North and West of London). It is an area which the Government has designated as being under serious water



stress. Furthermore, it is estimated that by 2040 there will be an extra 600,000 people living in 280,000 new homes in this supply area.

Affinity's Water Saving Programme will help to achieve a sustainable

supply in three ways:

• **Saving water** – Affinity will help us to save water, save energy and save money by providing free advice and free water-saving devices.

• **Metering** – water meters encourage us to use less because we only pay for what we use. Affinity plans to install 280,000 meters by 2020 and will give customers the choice to keep paying non-metered charges for up to two years.

• Reducing leakage – Affinity has committed to reducing leakage by 14% -27 million litres per day by 2020.

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Do you play boules?

Boules (also known as petanque) is a traditional French game that has become ever more popular in Britain. One of the big advantages over bowls is that you don't need a particulary special surface to play it on—just welldrained hard dirt or gravel.



The Parish Council is ready to install a court should there be demand among our residents.



Boules is often played by small groups of men and women in a social environment particularly on warm dry days. The Council owns open spaces close to the village centre where a suitable court for one or two teams might be

installed along with a few benches for onlookers and players.

North Meads

The main focus of work in The Meads this winter is on the trees and undergrowth on the north side of the river alongside the bridleway.

The success of the pollarding and planting that we did in the eastern plantation of goat willows last winter (see photo) has led us to make more ambitious plans for the western plantation this year.



The trees here are in even worse condition than those in the other plantation so, working with Rothamsted Research, we will pollard about six of the healthier ones and remove the rest altogether. Then, and this is the exciting bit, we will plant about 30 willow sets from up to ten different species, chosen because of the variety of colour in their trunks (red, brown, green, yellow, purple), leaf shape and potential height. These have been donated by Rothamsted Research who have helped us choose from their stock of about 150 different species. In a few years, we will have a very special and eye-catching group of willow trees that will be a unique feature of The Meads.



We have also been working to clear more of the invasive holly that has surrounded the magnificent mature oaks and field maples that mark the line of the ancient earth bank alongside the bridle path.

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They include some of the finest and most beautiful trees in the parish and deserve to be seen and admired, as in the photo. Finally (for this year anyway), we plan to plant five white poplars behind the eastern willow plantation where there is a gap in the line of large mature trees. This will help to screen the houses on the far side and maintain the semirural feel that everyone enjoys in The Meads.

On Monday 28 November 2016, all of Year 5 was invited to go tree planting so obviously we accepted the offer. The walk was long and tiring but there were no





Someday I hope I can visit the forest when I am older and tell my children or grandchildren that I built this forest when I was in Primary School.
