Wheathampstead Dementia Friendly Community ('WDFC') launch event on 11 March 2015 and plans for the future.

We would like to thank everyone who was involved in making our launch event on 11 March such a success, especially the Wheathampstead Patient Participation Group (WPPG). The aim of the launch was to help support dementia sufferers, their families and carers. Five speakers gave us insight into the issues involved. Gayl Staines spoke about the work of the Alzheimer's Society. Margaret Carter gave a moving talk about how she had cared for her husband and described how heart-rending it had been watching his deterioration. Fiona Harrall, who works for a Home Care Provider and is a Dementia Champion, spoke about her work in helping to increase awareness of this disease and Dr Gibbs expressed his support for the work of the WDFCG. Paul Millac, a retired Neurologist, described how he had looked after his wife Judith for the 8 years entirely at home. He described how our GP and the local community services were most supportive. Paul felt it was a challenge to find other help and he had appreciated the informal support of 'Coffee in the Chancel' at St Helen's.

Paul distributed a document, produced by himself and Andy Capy of the WPPG, with all the local services available. In addition there is a more detailed leaflet available from the Surgery and Manor Pharmacy. A helpline has been set up with Paul Millac on 01582 834490 and Margaret Carter on 01582 832368. The Wheathampstead Friends, the Transport Group, Wheathampstead Churches Together and the Parish Council have all pledged support. The Pharmacy will take on a signposting role.

The next phase of creating a 'dementia friendly village' is underway, with members of our group becoming dementia friendly champions offering dementia awareness sessions to organisations in Wheathampstead. Our aim is to ensure that people are aware of what is available and how to access these services. The last phase will be to encourage those with dementia and their carers to come forward to help overcome the stigma of the condition. **Isobel Poole/Paul Millac**

Wheathampstead Open Spaces Volunteers

Since my last article WOSV have visited Gustard Wood Common on two occasions. The first visit achieved much by clearing scrub from the south eastern boundary and exposing the ancient laid hedge that was once the boundary between the Lamer Estate and the Common. The hornbeam



hedge sits on top of a bank forming the eastern side of a holloway; a ditch with two banks used to move livestock to and from their grazing. The photos show an example of a typically neglected laid hedge with the 'stool' (some 400+ years old) with newer growth above it. As you walk the

boundary the ditch and banks gradually fade away. However, for a few yards, you can imagine yourself herding your cattle down to the river for water. The second visit built upon the work of the previous two years. We raised the crowns of the oaks around the grassland to improve light to the woodland floor and chopped back the new holly growth and other scrub. Previously trimmed gorse seems to be thriving and a small piece of heather has been found, the area around the grassland where we beat back

invading brambles now has wild flowers which are typical of slightly acid unimproved grassland. Our next visit, on the 9th May is to the Rectory Copse, an area running parallel to the western crinklecrankle wall. The Parish Council is managing the copse to improve visual appeal, encouraging



biodiversity, particularly insect life, invertebrates and birds. Whilst here we will be able to admire the strangely curved crinkle-crankle wall, the only one in Hertfordshire, which once enclosed the rectory orchard. Access to the copse is from Ash Grove, King Edward Place or the Churchyard. WOSV meet on the second Saturday of the month to augment the Parish Council's management plans for our open spaces. De Havilland air crash over Wheathampstead

We have often heard of the story of how Geoffrey de Havilland and John Cunningham crashed their aircraft over Wheathampstead. Indeed it merited a display board outside the Swan public house during it's recent rebuild. Details of the event are slowly drifting into the mists of history. What then is the true story?

The very first correction to the popular story is that the pilot was not Geoffrey de Havilland but his 29 year old son, Geoffrey Junior. De Havilland had developed the new Moth Minor (D.H.94). It came just at the right time as the Civil Air Guard training scheme wanted young and old alike to learn to

fly. Talk of war in 1939 had brought the realisation that we needed pilots. The D.H.94 was the ideal training aircraft. Tuesday 11 April 1939 while testing the new prototype Moth Minor G-AFRD which took off from Hatfield is when this notorious incident took place. Geoffrey Junior was in the front seat with John Cunningham in the rear. They



climbed to 8,000 feet. Spin tests were required to see how the aircraft handled. You never know when you would get in a spin, but if you did you needed to know the aircraft would recover. Geoffrey Junior threw the craft deliberately into a left hand spin. They completed 8 turns and recovered the aircraft safely. They climbed again to 8,000 feet and threw the aircraft into right hand spin. The engine coughed and stopped, every pilots nightmare when the engine goes quiet. The nose reared up and the Moth Minor went into a flat spin, fluttering down like a maple tree seed. A difficult situation to get out of and often fatal. Geoffrey Junior spoke through the Gosport tube to tell John that he was getting no response from the controls and suggested they jump. Cunningham climbed onto one wing first and jumped, while Geoffrey close behind did the same. They jumped successfully and both chutes opened. Now pilotless, the Moth Minor pulled out of the spin and the airspeed turned the propeller and started the engine. The aircraft continued its spiral decent circling one of the pilots and adding a new terror to the descending airman. The aircraft crashed into a tree and iron fence with engine roaring, and burst into flame. The pilots landing half mile apart were no worse for the ordeal, collected up their parachutes and went off to find a telephone. Farmer Mr. G. Norbury saw the crash on the near by Gustard Wood common from his house at Home

Farm. Before long the two pilots were joined by an investigation team from Hatfield and all adjourned to the Crooked Chimney Pub on their way back to Hatfield, for a welcome drink and dinner.

Frederick Kelvey, working at a local farm told the Herts Advertiser "I saw the pilots bail out, then the machine continued to circle round as if it was still being piloted. The machine seemed to be circling round one of the pilots as he descended with his parachutes and it was a miracle that it did not hit him. I thought it was an airman's stunt".

For the more technical, modifications were hurriedly made. The tail plane was raised, anti spin strakes fitted to the side of the fuselage and increase was made to the rudder area. Other smaller modifications were made to the aircraft, so it could spin safely in either direction and become the ideal trainer it was intended to be. **Terry Pankhurst**

Hedgegrow planted

A short length of hedge has been laid on the eastern side of the track leading up to the scout hut from Meads Lane. In this "South of England" style, the hedge is cut and laid over with a single line of stakes 18" apart in the centre of the hedge with the top bound, both sides of the hedge being trimmed. Hedge laying declined after the second world war as a result of low availability of labour, mechanised hedge cutting, wire fences and an emphasis placed on production (grubbed out hedges to create larger fields). Locally there are many examples of laid hedges in particular at Heartwood Forest where a recent competition attracted hedge layers from across the

land. Hedge laying is one technique for managing hedgerows, coppicing and trimming being examples of others. Left unmanaged a hedgerow would continue to grow upwards, eventually becoming a line of trees. Laid hedge prevents cattle from leaning against it and sheep from pushing through the at the base , and are a haven for wildlife, and are important for their scenic value.



Once a hedge is laid regular trimming will keep it in good order for many years, after which it may be appropriate to lay the hedge again. The hedge by the scout hut was laid using locally coppiced hazel which provided the stakes and the binders (the plaited binding along the top). **Peter Ryan**.

Wheathampstead Dialect – what did we sound like a hundred years ago?

Like most areas in the country, Hertfordshire had its own dialect – now largely lost as people become more mobile. Recordings from the 1950's and 60's made in villages nearby reveal a soft East Anglian twang was the norm. The British Library has a recording made in Wheathampstead of Mr Bracey who talks about traditional hay stacking techniques and describes the design of a plough.

You can play the sound if you have access to the British Library web site (<u>www.bl.uk</u> under "Collections" select "Sounds" and the "Accents and Dialects"). There you will find a survey of English dialects and by following further links the one from Wheathampstead. You can also try the following link: <u>http://sounds.bl.uk/Accents-and-dialects/Survey-of-English-dialects</u>.

Here are some dialect words – do you use any of them today?

Bever – a mid-morning snack eaten at work. **Blate** – to moan or complain, also to gossip and prattle on.

Chaffer - to bargain or complain.

Croons – cherries, from the Carroon (or Kerroon) cherry variety that Hertfordshire was famous for. Joskin – an amusing character such as a country bumpkin.

Mizzy Mozzy - dazed, confused, as in "it was all mizzy mozzy".

Moggy - woman and Moggies - women, as in

"she's such a flighty moggy" Pimmick – fool. Tack – food or equipment.

Ten a days - in those days.

Tokened – betrothed, engaged to be married. Wuss and Wusserer – worse and worser.

Don't be a statistic, take five minutes to read the following information, it could save your life.

Over the last quarter there has been a worrying trend towards house fires. Every five days someone dies from a fire caused by a cigarette. In Hertfordshire last year nearly 60% of all our fires started in kitchens. We surveyed a complete road

after a recent fire in Wheathampstead and the statistics were worrying: over 50% either had no smoke alarms, the alarms they had didn't work or they were in the wrong position. Did you know that manufacturers recommend smoke alarms should be replaced when 10 years old whether they work or not? We tend to think that fire won't happen to us but believe me when I say that fire doesn't discriminate and could happen to anyone of us. How would you escape, would you have even woken up? If you take nothing else from this article, go and test your smoke alarms now. If your alarms aren't working either replace them yourself or contact us on the numbers below immediately. So what can you do to help reduce the risk of having a fire in your property?

- Switch plugs off on electrical items that don't need to be on.
- Don't have items charging overnight.
- Don't have your washing machine, tumble drier or dishwasher running overnight.
- Always double check that you turned your cooker off.
- Close all your doors before going to bed.
- Put cigarettes out properly.
- Make sure your exit route is clear.
- Put your door keys in a place where everyone can get to them quickly.

Our Youth Project has experienced a few changes since the New Year. With new staff and an average weekly attendance of 35 young people, it is a dynamic space for all to work in. Since January young people have continued to benefit from structured games under the supervision of Youth Connexions on the all-weather football pitch which has proved very popular. A big challenge for the project was in the forming of relationships between all people. Young people are supported and challenged on how they conduct themselves and we believe this is integral to the social development of young people of Wheathampstead. Building on this we have done work around drugs, education and managing personal relationships and are always looking at new needs young people present. This approach has led to greater inclusion for all young people that attend.

We delivered an Easter holiday provision on Tuesday afternoons instead of in the evening which enabled a more flexible approach outside of the building. We have made contact with young people from Wheathampstead to Harpenden. The recent weather has been a huge benefit to this. Lastly, we undertook a small group consultation which engaged over 25 of the regular attendees. Some key points from this were: better resources available in the building; open more than once a week; more fun activities for the younger age groups. Jay Barnes who regularly attends said, "I always enjoy coming to the project and me and friends look forward to the football area under floodlights. Oh yeah, the staff are quite cool too."

We recommenced opening on the 28 April and look forward to another term of positive support to the young people of Wheathampstead.
