Opening of the new St Albans Museum + Gallery

The eagerly-awaited St Albans Museum + Gallery will open its doors to the public on Friday 8 June following a two-year restoration and redevelopment project. Visitors will be invited to enjoy a dynamic programme of events to celebrate the opening of this arts, heritage and cultural attraction in the newly-transformed building.

Free buses for Wheathampstead children

Local children who attend schools in Harpenden are being given free bus transport from the start of the 2018 summer term. This decision was made as a result of Lower Luton Road being classified as an 'unsafe' route for children to walk to school.

Congestion on the High Street

This continues to be an issue, often as a result of drivers misusing the loading bay outside Tesco which was designed for only two vehicles. Our County Councillor is negotiating with Herts County Council to alter the shape of the bay by reducing the width of the pavement and placing a bell bollard at the narrow end of the lay-by to prevent the parking of a third vehicle.

WPC Volunteer Awards

Organising Village Weekend and Lights Up, maintaining our open spaces, restoring the station platform, creating the Jubilee Garden, Litterblitz – the list goes on. It is activities like these that help to make our village such a pleasant and vibrant place to live.

And they all depend on volunteers who give their time and skills without payment.

With this in mind, the Parish Council is setting up an award scheme to recognise individual volunteers. Those who volunteer regularly will be presented with a green pin-badge with the village logo. Those who show outstanding dedication to the village through volunteering will receive a gold badge. The first gold badges will be awarded at the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 16 May 2018.

We have some catching-up to do, so quite a number of awards will be made on that evening; we will catch up on the backlog in 2019.

Local history

Abbot John of Wheathampstead



It is not unusual for archaeologists to find ancient skeletons but it is very unusual, if not unique, for them to find the remains of a 'lost' abbot. But that is what happened in December last year when the grave of Abbot John of Wheathampstead was uncovered in a dig at St Albans Abbey. They knew it was Abbot John because also in the grave were three papal seals, known as 'papal bulls'. These were issued by Pope Martin V (1417-1431) when he granted special privileges to the monastery of St Albans following a visit by Abbot John.



Mackerye End

Abbot John (after whom a pub behind the station was renamed) was born in about 1390 and brought up by his parents, Hugh and Margaret Bostock, at Mackerye End. He was elected abbot at St Albans in 1420, resigned in 1440, was re-elected in 1451, and died in 1465.



According to the seventeenth century historian Sir Henry Chauncy, he was "... very famous for his great learning, his Godly life and conversation, and his great affection to the beauty of the House of God; and he was so espoused and betrothed to it that he raised great sums of money to adorn and enrich the same".

Abbot John will be reburied in the Abbey.

Caring for the river

Completion of river works



We are delighted to report that the work to improve the river banks in The Meads, as described in the Spring edition of The Pump, has been completed.

From 23 January to 13 March, 24 volunteers from Wheathampstead Open Spaces Volunteers, the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust, the Verulam Angling Club and the Environment Agency put in 268 hours' work to get the work done. We

pollarded the willows on the north side of The Meads, drove 160 chestnut stakes into the river bed along about 80 metres of river bank, and wove the willow poles between the stakes to reinforce the eroded bank – a traditional technique called 'spiling'. We collected more willow poles from Lemsford Springs (courtesy of the Wildlife Trust) and from the Verulam Angling Club's fishery at Leasey Bridge (thanks to them for all their help).

Our contractors, Maydencroft, built five entry points into the river where the existing informal entry points were causing even more erosion.

The entire project was paid for with a grant from the Wild Trout Trust to whom we are very grateful.

The future of your village

You may be aware that your parish council is preparing а Neighbourhood Plan which will give more control over the development of the village, particularly with regard to new development. Once approved in a referendum of residents, the plan will become part of the St Albans planning process and must he considered planning when permission is sought by individuals and companies.

At May's Annual Parish Meeting, we will be presenting an early draft of the plan for your comments. The main areas covered include:

- Housing: Size and location of development, housing mix.
- Transport and Movement: Public transport, walking and cycling, parking.
- Character and Conservation: High quality building design, sustainable design, attractive street scene.
- Community Facilities: Community hub, education and medical provision, allotments, sports, heritage.

- Environment: Minimising the impact of development, protecting habitats and green spaces, protecting local views.
- Town Centre and Economy: Protecting the High Street, employment, rural economy development.

We also want Wheathampstead to be a SAFE village: **Sustainable, Accessible, Fairtrade, Ecological**.

This theme will be emphasised throughout the plan.

Gustard Wood Common

In March we returned to Gustard Wood Common, where the Parish Council owns 18.5 acres of woodland to the east of Lamer Lane. Gustard Wood Common is an area of mixed secondary woodland, heath and neutral/acid grassland.

The Parish Council's management plan for Gustard Wood identifies removing invading scrub to preserve the locally rare acid grassland near the road and around the picnic bench. This grassland is relatively species-rich and contains plants such as Yellow Archangel, Dog's Mercury and Wood Speedwell that are indicators of it having resembled ancient woodland The eastern boundary includes old some hornbeams that mark the boundary

with the Lamer Estate.

The name Gustard derives from the Anglo-Saxon word for Juniper, a locally rare plant. The dense spread of holly in the woods prevents light from reaching the woodland floor so we are clearing some of it to create glades and open spaces.

In May and June we will go back to Marshalls Heath where we have been working to preserve and enhance the habitat that is a key Hertfordshire site for butterflies and moths. The Heath is designated as a Local Nature Reserve.
